#### HSC exams wind down

This week most of our students will have finished their HSC exams. The presiding officers for the exams have indicated how much they have appreciated the cooperative approach taken by all our students during what can be a very stressful time. On Thursday 15 November we have the year 12 formal and then the graduating class of 2018 moves onto their next great adventure.

#### The P&C is making a difference for our students

At the last P&C meeting the P&C indicated that they were going to be able to provide around \$30,000 for the school to use to support our students. This is a huge achievement, particularly when you take into account challenges such as finding volunteers for the canteen and the busy lives that P&C members and families face. At our November meeting the school will be talking to the P&C about how we might use this money. One idea that has been discussed with the P&C has been that we purchase an additional laptop trolley and set of laptops to further increase student access to portable computer technology. We could also look at another water cooler for the bubblers outside the student toilet because the cooler installed near the hall has been very popular. Another idea has been to look at acquiring more outdoor seating for the quadrangle area so that the existing seating could be placed in other parts of the school. We will collate these ideas and discuss them with the P&C. Even if we decide not to use P&C funding it may be possible to respond via the 2019 school budget.

# School Based Drug and Alcohol information session by Paul Dillon Alstonville High School Hall - Thursday 22 November 5pm to 7pm

Alstonville High School will be hosting a Drug Information evening presented by Drug Education expert Paul Dillon.

Mr Dillon's presentation aims to empower parents, carers and the wider school community with the knowledge and skills to be able to support young people and develop effective strategies in relation to drug and alcohol use. The session will be available to parents/carers and the wider school community both within our school and other local schools in our region.

Paul Dillon has been working in the area of drug education for the past 25 years. He is the founder of the Drug and Alcohol Research and Training Australia (DARTA) and has been contracted both nationally and internationally to deliver education on alcohol and other drugs. He continues to work with many school communities across the country to ensure that they have access to good quality information and best practice drug education. An ex-school teacher, Paul has an interest in working with young people, and regularly provides drug information sessions and workshops to students across the country and is the author of the best-selling book for parents titled 'Teenagers, Alcohol and Drugs' which was released in 2009.

Paul's extensive experience, research and training ensures that his community presentations provide the most up to date data and facts and are carefully designed to address local issues.

With a broad knowledge of a range of content areas, Paul regularly provides media comment and is regarded as a key social commentator in Australia, appearing on a wide range of television programs including Sunrise, TODAY and The Project discussing topical issues. He has had many media interviews on the subject of drug culture, and his current areas of interest are drug education, youth issues, and ecstasy and related drugs.

The information session is going to be held in the Alstonville High School Hall on Thursday 22 November from 5pm-7pm. Light refreshments will be available.

As a result of a question posed by parents about students' ages, I contacted the Department of Industry, Innovation and Science who awarded Alstonville High School the four Student Science Engagement scholarships (courtesy of the Inspiring Australia - Science Engagement Program). With their approval, the criteria for the scholarships has been changed.

The new criteria is as follows:

This now allows ANY student who will be in year 9 or year 10 in 2019 to apply.

Students who wish to apply need to obtain an expression of interest form from L6.

Students who have already handed in their expression of interest form **DO NOT** need to obtain a new form.

# **Report on the 2018 Agricultural Shows**

#### Lismore Show 18 October

Students from years 8, 9, 10 and 11 have been involved with the preparation of two steers for the Lismore Show. The year 11 Primary Industries class handled a lot of the husbandry and early calming activities. The feeding partnership with Riverina Stock Feeds has been very effective and gratefully received. An early cattle-handling excursion with year 10 students in Casino resulted in the development of student skills and the selection of our show team. The school also had the assistance of Tristan, from Norco Rural for some show preparation and grooming development and were lucky to receive some expert instruction during the holidays from a Kadina student Ms Nellie Witt.

Two Limousin steers were entered into the following classes on the day:

- Medium live weight 410kg domestic born at Alstonville High School
- Heavy live weight 538kg domestic purchased from Neville Creighton who has assisted the school for many years.

Lily Christmas and Eloise Hagate led the school animals on the day and Alahna Thomson led another producer's heifer in a separate class. All girls managed to be put forward (selected for finalist consideration) in their respective classes in a field of entries which was compared as equivalent to this year's EKKA by some of the judges and auctioneers on the day. Eloise led our heavyweight entry to win a third place in the George and Furmann Steer Classic later that night. The steer received a \$75 prize, which has been spent on a set of five handheld fertiliser spreaders for class activities. The same steer won a fifth place in the carcase competition resulting in an additional \$25 prize. A big thank you to the students who supported our paraders – Owen Halpin, Nelson Butler, Erin Bryce, Briar Godillon, Charly-Ann Nolte and Isaac White. Special thanks to Jack Nielsen, Angus Shum and Charlotte Nunn for helping Lily and Eloise on the day of the show. Also a special mention to the parents who supported students through the holidays and on the day of the show and thanks to Jill Groth our Agricultural Assistant for her extensive help throughout the process. Without Jill's help, support, guidance and knowledge this would not have been possible.



#### Alstonville Show 27 October

The agriculture department entered a number of livestock and horticultural competitions using student work from a range of classes. A stud bull calf supplied on loan by Stephen Maginnity was entered in the small breed stud cattle and junior paraders competitions.

**Collection of natives** (year 9 Bonsai project Ficus macrophylla species) Jade Cumming, Levi Shaw, Charlotte Munday and Aeryn Peiti won a highly commended notice from the judges.

**Ornamental plants** - Two potted Roses from year 10 - Niari Lee Bultitude, Adam Fletcher and a Croton by Sophie McKie, which won first prize in the ornamental plants category.

**Cabbage** - year 9 - Riley Ball (Red cabbage) won first prize in its class. The cabbage was a team entry including the work of Dakota Harder, Kaeleb Hoad, Rhys Hurlock and Riley Hughes amongst a number of other year 9 agriculture students.

Lily Christmas and Eloise Hagate constructed an agricultural produce display and students made a second display from the year 8 agriculture 2 class.

The Stud Limousin bull calf won 1<sup>st</sup> prize in the 12 month and under class and 1<sup>st</sup> prize in the best European bull class led by Lily and supported by Eloise. Alahna Thomson led our bull calf in the all breeds event for a 2<sup>nd</sup> place finish under a very high quality Angus bull. The show team have decided to enter the bull calf in the upcoming Bangalow Show on Saturday 17 November to finish a successful show year.
